Invited speakers & CAS supervisors

Associate professor Anna Bilon, University of Lower Silicia, Poland

Anna deals with career counselling, social work, and social inequalities analysis. She is interested in the impact of neoliberal policy on social practices as well as the research methodology. A part of her research pertains to cultural issues and differences and analysing social practices from the comparative perspective.

Associate professor Rosie Alexander, University of the West of Scotland

Rosie is a career adviser and researcher with key expertise in delivery of guidance services in remote and rural communities and in the career development needs of people living in these communities.

MA Tine Andersen, Studievalg Danmark (Study and Career Guidance Denmark)

Tine works as a specialist consultant in Studievalg Denmark's Secretariat. She primarily works with development of guidance qualifications and skills of the studyand career guidance counsellors in the organization.

Post doc Anouk Albien, University of Lausanne, Switzerland

Anouk is currently a senior researcher at University of Lausanne (UNIL) and interested in career development trajectories – specifically, career transitions, mobility and migration, including vulnerability and resiliency mechanisms. She is a registered career counsellor and is a research affiliate with Stellenbosch University, where she completed her PhD training.

Associate professor Annica Brännlund, Umeå University, Sweden

Annica works at the Department of Applied Educational Sciences where she teaches at the Career Guidance program. In her research she focusses on the value of education for e.g., individuals' health and capabilities.

Professor Valerie Cohen Scali, Conservatoire National des Arts et Métiers, France

Valérie is director of the research group on "Identity Construction and Professionalization", and a member of the UNESCO Chair on "Lifelong Guidance and Counselling" of the University of Wroclaw, Poland. Her fields of research are: Young adults' identity construction, transition and career redirections, professionalization of career counsellors and trainers.

Senior consultant Jan Bauditz, Danish Teachers Union, Denmark

Jan has been involved with policymaking in the field of young people's transition from school to upper secondary education for 15 years. He has been involved in the policy processes of the large and small reforms in the area over the years and have a particular focus on the problem of early leaving and dropouts from VET in Denmark. Further, the role of counselling and guidance of young people in their transition from school to upper secondary/VET education.

Associate professor Nikos Drosos, European University Cyprus, Cyprus

Nikos is a psychologist with expertise in career counselling and guidance and have worked in the field of counselling and career guidance for more than 15 years. He is currently an Assistant Professor of Career Guidance and Counselling at the European University Cyprus. His main research interests focus on career counselling and supported employment of people from socially vulnerable groups.

Professor Tristram Hooley, University of Derby, UK

Tristram is a researcher and writer specializing in career and career guidance. He has published nine books and numerous articles and reports. He is Professor of Career Education at the University of Derby, Professor II at the Inland Norway University of Applied Sciences, and Chief Research Officer at the Institute of Student Employers

Assistant professor Laura Cordes Felby, Aarhus University, Denmark

Laura work with educational development with an explicit focus on transitions in the educational system. Her research interests are within first year didactics, curriculum development- and analysis, pedagogy, social justice and career education. Since December 2021 Laura is employed in a postdoc position at Centre for Educational Development with a focus on first-year didactics, both in research projects and development work.

Professor Kristina Mariager-Anderson, Aarhus University, Denmark

Kristina is an associate professor in guidance at the Danish School of Education at Aarhus University in Copenhagen, and Professor II in career guidance at the University of South-Eastern Norway. She researches multiple aspects of education and career guidance, particularly in relation to young adults, career transitions, and labour market mobility. She is head of the research unit for professional guidance and counselling at DPU, Aarhus University.

Associate professor Helle Merete Nordentoft, Aarhus University, Denmark

In her research Helle is concerned with the ways in which different forms of career guidance contribute to how professionals and students in higher education (university/vocational colleges) and health care contexts can navigate in complex, sometimes rather unpredictable practice. The question is how individual and collective forms of guidance facilitate critical reflexive and also interdisciplinary learning practices.

Professor Per-Åke Rosvall, Umeå University, Sweden

Per-Åke work in the field of sociology of education with focus on class, gender and ethnicity. He is currently working on school transitions and school to work transitions

and vocational education. Even though he has a general interest in those questions, lately he has also been involved in projects focusing on place and migration.

Associate professor Randi Skovhus, VIA University College, Denmark

Randi works with research and development work around career guidance in the Research Center for Pedagogy and Education and the Research Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship. She also mediates research and facilitate development processes in collaboration with guidance environments, schools and educational institutions.

Post doc Bent Sortkær is a post doc of education, teaching, and inequalities at the Danish School of Education at Aarhus University. His research focus on how to create an educational system that offer equal opportunities for success irrespectively of students' social background.

MA Birtha Theut, The Danish Agency for Higher Education and Science, Denmark

Birtha works as an international adviser at the National Agency for Erasmus+ and is responsible for the Danish Euroguidance Centre. She works with the international dimension in guidance and contributes to the competence development of career guidance counsellors in Denmark and the EU within this field.

Professor Rie Thomsen, Aarhus University, Denmark

Rie is Professor of Career Guidance at Aarhus university and adviser to Skills Norway in building a national framework for quality in career guidance and career learning. She researches collective aspects of career guidance and has a particular interest in participatory research and social justice. Rie Thomsen is co-founder of ECADOC.

M. Sc Lone Conradsen Wind Study and Career Guidance Denmark

Lone works as a study- and career guidance counsellor in the regional education and career guidance centre in the southern part of Jutland. She provides guidance to young people and adults about transitions and choice of higher and vocational education and prospective career opportunities in Denmark.

Learning outcomes

By the end of the summer school, participants will be able to:

- 1. articulate diverse relations between theory, policy, research, and practice
- 2. critically consider research design, concepts, and methods in the career guidance research field
- 3. apply critical thinking to their own research design in their doctoral studies
- 4. identify potential future research collaborators and make plans for publication

What to prepare?

Workshops

Workshops will take place on Tuesday and Thursday.

Thematic Analysis with Kristina Mariager-Anderson Enhancing Reflexivity in Thematic Analysis: Exploring the Researcher's Role. The workshop presents a brief overview of TA and its key phases based on Braun and Clarke's framework; we will explore the development from the 2006-version till now with the increased focus on reflexivity, its significance in qualitative research, and its integration into the thematic analysis process. Participants will be engaged in discussing TA in relation to their own research.

Participatory observation with Per-Åke Rosvall Participatory observation. A

presentation on experiences of doing critical ethnography with special focus on fieldnotes and interviews followed by a workshop based on the participants own fieldnotes.

On-Line research method with Tristram Hooley You will be invited to discuss your experiments with using online methods and consider how these differ from face-to-face approaches. Ultimately, you will be asked to consider whether online research is just a question of using new tools, or whether it challenges us to think more radically about our role as researchers.

Mixed methods in social science research: A trend or a necessity? with Nikos

Drosos. The workshop will focus on the use of mixed-methods research projects in social sciences. We will discuss the theoretical foundations of quantitative and qualitative research designs, and whether the use of mixed methods is necessary to better address the challenges and questions of contemporary career issues. The workshop will make use of case studies, and participants will have the opportunity to take feedback and discuss their own examples of mixed-methods research design.

Randomized career guidance field experiments – design and implementation with Bent Sortkær (Only on Thursday)

After a short overview of 3-5 experimental designs from existing research, participants will present (briefly) their thoughts/plans of conducting an experimental design in career guidance research. We will then discuss, questioning, tear apart (!) and hopefully put participants' research designs nicely together again. The large share of the workshop is devoted to working with own and each other's research designs. NB. Collective Academic Supervision (CAS)

A key feature of ECADOC Summer Schools is Collective Academic Supervision (CAS), where doctoral researchers meet in small groups, present their thesis project as a work-in- progress, and benefit from feedback from peers and more experienced academics.

This year each CAS group will be made up of 4 doctoral researchers, together with a CAS supervisor from the organising or lecturer team who will moderate the process. The groups will work in parallel during Tuesday and Wednesday. Each session will allocate 60 minutes for presentations and feedback, followed by more general discussions of shared interests and concerns.

Doctoral candidates are therefore invited to prepare a presentation - together with

supportive material such as a short PowerPoint – summarizing their project and *focusing on a particular issue or challenge related to your thesis*. Your presentation should last no more than 7 to 10 minutes. The presentation and any supporting material should be in English. It will be shared online with other participants. We would also like you to formulate your own personal goals for the discussion, such as, for instance, the questions or challenges which you would like to get feedback on from your peers. It is completely up to you to choose which aspect of your research you want to focus on, and whether you wish to highlight issues related to content or process.

In line with the Collective Academic Supervision model, all group members are expected to give and receive structured feedback. The emphasis is on learning from each other, not on defending one's research. You will be allocated to a group. You will know your group and supervisor prior to the summer school.

The Collective academic model has been described in two articles published in Higher Education if you would like to read more about the model before or after taking part.

Interactive workshop with Euroguidance facilitated by Tristram Hooley, Rie Thomsen, Birtha Theut and Tine Andersen

The focus ECADOC 2023 is collaboration between research, practice and policy and we have a partnership with Euroguidance Denmark. This has enabled us to develop a new format: Interactive workshops.

The goal of the interactive workshop is to create a playful space for the exchange of perspectives on real-world career guidance cases with career guidance professionals.

In the workshop, local career professionals and ECADOC participants work together on a real-world case described by the professionals.

On Tuesday from 16:00 – 17:00 all participants will be divided into groups of three and presented with a short description of the case.

You can then discuss the case in the group:

- Read the case and think about what kind of knowledge you have that will be helpful.
- Think about what research could be done to help solve this problem/challenge.
- Think about what you would like to share in the workshop.

On Wednesday from 13:00 – 16:00 all participants go to Sønderborg to take part in a facilitated process (3 hours) with the career professionals about the case. Be prepared to:

- Introduce yourself in a broad manner including previous education and work experience, max three minute.
- Take part in a facilitated playful process focusing on the case.
